This 34th Annual Learning Differences conference will emphasize current work on the importance of executive function strategies in mediating stress and fostering persistence and resilience in students as they navigate school challenges. Presentations will focus on innovative research and the implications for effective clinical practice and classroom teaching. There will be an emphasis on executive function strategies that benefit all students from kindergarten into high school and college, and span reading, writing, math, as well as content area subjects.

- How do we promote a school culture that fosters metacognitive awareness and the teaching of executive function strategies?
- How do executive function weaknesses affect the performance of students with LD, ADHD, ASD, and other learning difficulties?
- How do we promote students' strengths and reduce their anxiety and stress in the context of the classroom?
- How do we promote self-regulation and executive function strategies in the early elementary grades?

The conference will include a combination of plenary sessions and smaller concurrent sessions to provide opportunities for in-depth discussion with faculty. The program will emphasize the application of theory and research to educational practice.

Dr. Lynn Meltzer is the President and Director of the Institutes for Learning and Development (ResearchILD and ILD) in Lexington, MA. She is a Fellow and Past-President of the International Academy for Research in Learning Disabilities. She is the Founder and Program Chair of this Annual Learning Differences Conference which she has chaired for the past 34

years. For 30 years, she was an Associate in Education at the Harvard Graduate School of Education and an Adjunct Associate Professor in the Department of Child Development at Tufts University. Her 40 years of clinical work, research, publications, and presentations have focused on understanding the complexity of learning and attention problems. Her extensive publications include articles, chapters, and books, most recently, Executive Function in Education: From Theory to Practice (2018), Promoting Executive Function in the Classroom (2010) and The Power of Peers in the Classroom: Enhancing Learning and Social Skills (2015), co-edited with Karen Harris. Together with her ResearchILD staff, she has developed SMARTS, an evidence-based executive function and peer mentoring/coaching curriculum for middle and high school students (www.smarts-ef.org).
